Student Led Conferences

On March 16th from 3:45-6:45, track four will have their student lead conferences. This will be an excellent opportunity to discuss your students' progress with them and witness many of the strategies we utilize in class. Science Expo

The Sycamore Creek science expo will take place on February 11, 2017. 5th grade students are required to complete a science project. Although, they are not required to partake in the science expo, those that do participate will receive a homework pass and valuable experience. Classroom science projects are due on February 10th. Several weeks ago in Friday folder there was a flyer and a rubric for the project. Curriculum Update

Math: In Math this week we began discussing order of operations involving expressions. First, we reviewed the specific order of operations with our students. Students were quick to remember the PEMDAS acronym. It is important to remember that multiplication and division are equal, as are addition and subtraction. For example, in this equation $(10 \div 2 \times 4 + 6)$ the division should be completed first and then the multiplication followed finally by the addition. In this equation $(15 - 10 \div 5 + 3)$ the division of 10 and five would be completed first, followed by the subtraction because it is before the addition in the equation. Finally, you would add three and come to the solution of 16. Next we started adding different versions of parenthesis, [brackets] and {braces}. These tell you the order of which to solve problems. It is important for students to remember to work from the inside out. First the problems within the parenthesis, then all of the problems in the brackets and finally the braces. We ended the week by writing equations from written words. For example, double the product of 4 and 6 then add two would be written as such $[2 \times (4 \times 6)] + 2$. We will continue to practice these skills at the beginning of next week.

Reading: In Reading this week, we began our new unit related to fantasy. We started this week by looking at events that could never happen versus moments that could actually occur. Next, we reviewed the general characteristics and elements of fantasy stories. For example, fantasy stories often have a main character that has to restore order to a universe. We typically will learn a lesson from the story through its theme. On Thursday and Friday we reviewed an excerpt of J.M. Barrie's "Peter Pan" and searched for evidence of a strong fantasy story. Students then charted out evidence of the fantasy story on a graphic organizer. We also listened to the first chapter of "Alice's Adventure in Wonderland" to find evidence of fantasy stories. Students seem to be very excited about our new genre study and I strongly encourage them to read various fantasy stories over the course of the next few weeks.

<u>Writing</u>: In Writing this week we started discussing our next writing genre, fantasy writing. Students read various fantasy stories on Monday and Tuesday in small groups noting the elements of fantasy within the stories they read. The students discussed the stories with their group and made notes about the stories. Next on Wednesday and Thursday, students crafted a short story using a wordless fantasy picture book. Next week students will begin crafting their fantasy story by selecting a theme they would like to teach their readers. They will also start to develop their main characters.

<u>Social Studies/Science:</u> This week in social studies we started our unit on the government of the United States. Students will learned about the three branches of our government and their functions. This week students learned about our government's foundation by learning about the Articles of Confederation and the Constitution. Students worked in small groups to review the statements of the preamble. Students wrote the preamble in kid friendly language and gave their reasons why this statement is essential. Next, students reviewed the articles of the Constitution and worked in small groups to create a Google Slides presentation for their particular article.

OBJECTIVES



I Can Statements:

I Can... In order to bring purpose to what your child is learning, we post I CAN statements on our board daily. It is important that your child is continually utilizing these to evaluate their understanding. You can check in with your student by discussing the following statements.
