## Science Expo

The Sycamore Creek science expo will take place on February 11, 2017. $5^{\text {th }}$ grade students are required to complete a science project however, they are not required to partake in the science expo. However, those that do participate will receive a homework pass and valuable experience. Classroom science projects are due on February $10^{\text {th }}$. Several weeks ago in Friday folder there was a flyer and a rubric for the project.

## Curriculum Update

Math: In Math this week we continued our study of dividing decimals. Students used concrete models to learn how to divide decimals by whole numbers. This was challenging for some of our Crocs. Be sure to have them continue to practice these skills over their track out. On Wednesday, we discussed how to utilize number lines to divide decimals by whole numbers. Here are a couple video clips of the methods we learned in class. Dividing decimals by whole numbers using grids, dividing decimals by whole numbers using number lines, dividing decimals by whole numbers using base ten blocks. On Thursday and Friday students practiced solving real world decimal multiplication and division word problems.

Reading: In Reading this week, we have continued to work on nonfiction texts, specifically we worked on perspective. Students learned that authors can frequently have different views or accounts of the same event or topic. To begin our lesson on Monday we looked at an optical illusion of a glass vase or two faces. It was interesting for students to connect our understanding of perspective with students visualizing the two different images. Next, we analyzed articles with two different perspectives related to the constitution. The first article we read described the constitution as a difficult document to understand and was needed to be put in kid friendly language. The next article we reviewed discussed a forgotten and often overlooked amendment to the Constitution, the $9^{\text {th }}$ amendment. We will continue to discuss author's point of view and perspective next week. We also took our Case 21 assessment in reading and Mr. T began mClass assessments this week. More information from both of these assessments will come after track out.

Writing: In Writing this week our students completed their opinion writing piece. I have begun reading and grading these writing pieces this week and am impressed with our students use of the writing strategies we have discussed in class. I plan to get students their writing grades on Monday of next week.

Social Studies/Science: This week in social studies we continued our study of the American Revolution and the 13 English
Colonies. We learned how these colonies were founded and what made the different regions of the early United States unique. We also discussed the many causes of the American Revolution. Students completed an around the room activity in which they read articles about the various taxes and acts and took notes on each one. We will wrap up our study of the American Revolution next week.
