Our annual school spelling bee will be held on January 17, 2020 at 8:30 am in the multipurpose room. This school wide event is open to 3rd-5th graders. Students who win their classroom spelling bee will move onto this event. Parents are invited to attend this monumental event as well. Please report to the multipurpose room before 8:30 to be a SILENT supporter. Participants will stay on stage as long as they are spelling words correctly. If a participant misses a word, they will stay in their seat through that round. Since this event takes place over our track out. A parent will need to transport their child to the bee.

A Scripp's Spelling Bee school list has been provided to your child. This covers the first grade -6th grade words. Please note that the spelling is NOT limited to these words. Curriculum Update

Math: In Math this week students continued our study of place value and decimals. Students reviewed comparing decimals and solved several real world problems in which they had to compare decimal numbers. On Wednesday, we began studying patterns when multiplying decimals by 10, 100, and 1000. Students utilized place value charts to visualize how the digits shift when a factor is multiplied by 10, 100, or 100. Students discussed and recorded patterns that they noticed. On Thursday, we completed another lesson that detailed what occurs when decimals are divided by 10, 100, or 1000. Students took an assessment on Friday that allowed them to display their understanding of reading, writing, and comparing decimals to the thousandths place.

Reading: In Reading this week we began writing our literary analysis essay of the text, "The Most Beautiful Roof in the World". Our literary essay will answer the essential question: what do the author's use of concrete language and sensory details help you understand about the rainforest? Students first reviewed our model essay to examine the structure of a literary analysis essay. Next, we crafted a focus statement in small groups and as a class that answered our essential question. Students then completed a graphic organizer that helped them structure their introduction. When then moved on to drafting our proof paragraphs. Each proof paragraph focused on explaining how specific concrete language and sensory details gave us a greater understanding of the rainforest. Next week we will continue with our drafting by completing a conclusion and peer revising and editing our work.

Social Studies/Science: In Social Studies this week our students began their new unit of study, Geography and Environmental Literacy. Students gathered notes about the five major regions of the United States via a PowerPoint presentation to provide a general overview of the regions. On Wednesday, students worked within a small group of 5 students to become an expert on one region. Students researched the landforms, water, climate, and resources of their given region. They also answered our essential question: how does the physical environment impact the settlement of individuals and determine how people meet their basic needs? On Monday, students will present their gathered information to their peers and collect notes from their peers.

OBJECTIVES



I Can Statements:
