## Curriculum Update

Math: In math this week, we continued our study of the order of operations. Students worked on comparing expressions without solving them. For example, in the following expressions $(8+9)$ and $3 \times(8+9)$, we know that the second expression will be three times larger because there is an added step. This was somewhat tricky at first as our natural inclination is to solve an equation. We then moved on to our first assessment on the Order of Operations. This quiz can be found in Friday folders. Next, we moved on to numeric patterns. Students solved problems by forming ordered pairs and graphing the ordered pairs. We will continue working on this skill next week.

Reading: In reading, this week, students continued our study of fantasy writing. This week we read multiple fantasy texts while paying close attention to character interactions and character responses. After reviewing the interactions and responses we then thought about what these interactions and responses could tell us about our character. This skill will become very helpful when we begin examining the theme of a story. Students learned this week that the main character of fantasy stories learn valuable lessons (theme) during the story, which in turn we also learn. In Writing, we began the week crafting detailed overviews of fantastical/magical objects. Students were given sentence and descriptive questions to help them dive into their imagination. Next, we began examining characters of fantasy stories by looking closely at what motivates their behavior. Students then applied this to their story ideas and characters. Students found what motivates their character and what behaviors they exhibit. We also began thinking of our characters strengths and weaknesses. Finally to wrap up the week we begin thinking about settings to our stories.

Social Studies: In social studies, we wrapped up our study of the articles of confederations and moved on to the formation of the constitution. We began by discussing the first and second constitutional congresses paying close attention to the compromises that were made. Next, we moved onto a closer examination of the three branches of government. Students viewed a "Brain Pop" and "Flocabulary" video while taking notes on the subject. We also completed an activity where students had to identify issues that each branch of government would be responsible for. Next, students began a partner project where they began creating a board game about the branches of government.

## OBJECTIVES



## I Can Statements:

I Can... In order to bring purpose to what your child is learning, we post I CAN statements on our board daily. It is important that your child is continually utilizing these to evaluate their understanding. You can check in with your student by discussing the following statements.

Math:

- use parentheses, brackets and braces to simplify an expression.

Reading:

- Determine a theme of a story, drama, or poem from details in the text, including how characters in a story or drama respond to challenges or how the speaker in a poem reflects upon a topic; summarizes the text.

Writing:

- Write fantasy writing pieces that integrate the elements of a fantasy

Social Studies:
Understand different forms of government and can explain the beginning documents that were designed after the American Revolution.
