Peter Pan

Plans for our first quarterly service project are underway. We have decided to provide our help by donating goodie bags to our local law enforcement officers. A sign up genius has been created and sent out with items we will need for this project. Please consider donating an item or two for this learning experience. We are excited to be able to help our law enforcement community for this first service project.

Curriculum Update

<u>Math</u> – This week in math our students continued to practice using the base ten models to add and subtract decimals. They were also introduced to the number line strategy. These two visual representations were then used to help make connections to the standard algorithm. Students have been encouraged to demonstrate their understanding of the standard algorithm in addition to either the number line or base ten visual models. An assessment was given on Thursday and will be in your child's Friday folder this week. This unit will wrap up with a fun Grocery Store Excursion. Please be sure to ask your child all about their progress on this topic.

Reading: Students have spent an abundant amount of time learning ways to delve into understanding characters in a fictional text. We continued to discuss character interactions, character traits, and character development this week. On Wednesday, I modeled how to engage in an effective discussion with a partner related to the standards we've covered so far. In our strategy groups this week, we practiced using post it notes to flag character interactions and responses to challenges within our text. Everyone has done an exceptional job identifying these interactions, but a few students need to continue to practice analyzing these encounters between characters.

<u>Writing</u>: In writing this week, we continued our study of memoirs. Mr. T shared with our students his personal memoir draft. Students continued to revise and edit their drafts and we discussed how to utilize dialogue to enhance our characters. Our final drafts will be due next week. The rubric for our narrative writing can be found here.

Science/Social Studies: This week, we continued our economics unit. Students learned about and investigated three specific types of economic systems. We studied traditional, command, and market economies. Students made bracelets, rings, and, necklaces in short investigations in which they were a part of each unique economy. Be sure to ask your student about each of these investigations. We also discussed concepts such as scarcity and surpluses and described how a scarcity or surplus can have an impact on cost, supply, and demand. We will finish this unit next week by taking a unit assessment on Monday.
