

Curriculum Update

<u>Math</u> – This week in math we continued to investigate decimals. Students used their understanding of place value in order to multiply and divide by Powers of 10. Students worked in partners to discuss their understanding and share their answers and reasoning. It is important that students are utilizing the place value chart if needed. This scaffolding tool helped several students better understand what happens to the digits when you multiply and divide. Students also learned how to <u>round decimal numbers</u> using base 10 grids and number lines. We will continue our decimal unit through next week.

Reading: Students continued to dig deeper in order to analyze their characters. Students watched "Casey at the Bat" and utilized a dice game to analyze characterization. During small group instruction, students worked with a partner to discuss how two characters interact within the text. They are required to apply their inferencing skills by focusing on how the character looks, acts, and feels. Building this foundation will help the students identify themes later in the year. They will continue to use text evidence to support their understanding.

<u>Writing</u>: In writing this week, we continued our study of memoirs. Students completed several reflective journal entries to dive deeper into their understanding of themselves. We completed entries about items, places, times, and people that were important to us. We also wrote short paragraphs about several of these events, people, and items. Next week, we will be searching for common themes to focus our memoirs around. The rubric for our narrative writing can be found here.

<u>Science/Social Studies:</u> In Science this week we completed our science unit and took our final assessment. We reviewed our assessment on Wednesday and then started our social studies unit on economics. I encouraged your student to discuss what spending and budgeting meant to your family, I truly appreciate all of your input.
